Minister Raitt Announces Appointment of Member to the National Energy Board

OTTAWA — The Honourable Lisa Raitt, Minister of Natural Resources, today announced the appointment of a temporary member, Mr. Hans Matthews, to the National Energy Board (NEB).

Mr. Matthews is a professional geologist with more than 25 years of experience. He has been the President of the Canadian Aboriginal Minerals Association since 1992. Mr. Matthews has also held executive positions focused on natural resource and environmental management, economic development and strategic policy and planning. He is a member of the Wahnapitae First Nation, Ontario, where he resides.

"I am very pleased to confirm the appointment of Mr. Matthews to the NEB," said Minister Raitt. "He brings with him a wealth of experience and expertise in resource management and in working with aboriginal communities."

The NEB is an independent federal agency that regulates Canada's oil, gas and electric utility industries. It promotes safety, environmental protection and economic efficiency with respect to the regulation of pipelines, energy development and trade. The NEB reports to Parliament through the Minister of Natural Resources.



February 9, 1857 - Anishinaabe Chiefs cede Owen Sound (Treaty No. 70, 82)

February 10, 1877 - Manitoulin chiefs meet with Indian agent to explain treaty relationship, show the medal given in 1764 as proof of alliance

February 10 1763 - Peace of Paris, ending the Seven Years War, signed by Britain, France and Spain

February 28, 1882 - Ojibwe Chiefs of Manitoulin states that all of their band members should receive Robinson Huron Annuity and that the interest payments for the island should be increased.




Heating Safety

Heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths. Almost half of home heating equipment fires are reported during the months of December, January, and February. Some simple steps can prevent most heating-related fires from happening.

SAFETY TIPS

- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, such as the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable heater.
- Only use heating equipment that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Never use your oven for heating.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected annually by a qualified professional.
- Turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- For fuel burning space heaters, always use the proper fuel as specified by the manufacturer.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to prevent sparks from flying into the room and burn only dry, seasoned wood. Allow ashes to cool before disposing in a metal container, which is kept a safe distance from the home.



- For wood burning stoves, install chimney connectors and chimneys following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation.
- Make sure all fuel-burning equipment is vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Install and maintain carbon monoxide (CO) alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning.
- If you smell gas in your gas heater, do not attempt to light the appliance. Turn off all the controls and open doors and windows. Call a gas service person.
- Test smoke alarms at least monthly.

Some men get roses on that special day, from the cooler at Kroger, "that's impressive," I say.


Some men buy fine diamonds from a flea market booth, "Diamonds are forever," they explain, suave and couth.
