



Systainable Development

Most life on earth depends on soil. It provides a medium for plants to grow and habitats for animals and other micro-organisms. Soil can be damaged by many causes including contaminated runoff, wind and water erosion, and overuse.

Soil communities are among the most species – rich areas in terrestrial ecosystems with most of the organisms found in the top 10cm of the soil profile. Soil organisms affect the functioning of entire ecosystem including nutrient cycling, development of soil structure, nutrient retention, disease suppression, carbon sequestration and pollutant degradation.

The extensive functions of soil, declining soil biodiversity and its consequences on soil food web interactions could have significant negative impacts on our ecosystem processes and all biodiversity.

A Well Thought Out FireSmart Protection Plan



- A Prune tree branches to a height of 1 or 2 metres
- B Store fire wood well away from the house
- C Remove trees within 10 metres of house
- Trees thinned (crowns don't touch) for at least 30 metres from the house
- E Branches are clear of power lines (if possible bury power service)
- F Remove brush, mow and water lawn
- G Your name and lot number clearly visible for quick identification
- H Driveway is wide enough to accommodate emergency vehicles
- I Provide additional emergency exit
- Pond or cistern with emergency water supply
- K A FireSmart ash pit or burning barrel
- L Driveway clear of trees to a distance of at least 3 or 4 metres
- M Chimney installed to code complete with spark arrestor screens
- N All soffit vents and gutters should be screened
- Porches and balconies screened, crawl spaces enclosed
- P Position propane tank with valve pointing away from house
- Q Fire resistant exterior roof and walls
- Protective drapes and or shutters on windows to protect interior from radiant heat

Wahnapitae First Nation Xstrata Post Secondary Scholarship Fund

Limited Qualified Candidates to Receive up to \$10,000 each Toward Post Secondary Studies

Both the Wahnapitae First Nation and Xstrata believe in the importance of a good education for Community members for the betterment of both Wahnapitae First Nation and Xstrata operations in the Sudbury area. Xstrata, through a formal agreement with Wahnapitae First Nation in 2008, has sponsored an annual scholarship fund to support post-secondary education and training programs. The scholarship fund is aimed at assisting community members of the Wahnapitae First Nation to pursue careers in the mining related and mineral processing field.

Both Wahnapitae First Nation and Xstrata have established a joint Human Resources Working Group to develop the criteria and mechanisms to select candidates and to administer this scholarship fund.

Scholarship Details

The Human Resources Working Group will determine eligible candidates. The annual scholarship is awarded annually up to 3 (three) successful students, up to a maximum of \$10,000 per candidate per year. For scholarship recipients to continue to receive an annual scholarship, they must RE-APPLYANNUALLY. The scholarship will be awarded to qualified Wahnapitae First Nation Community members (those who are a band member of the Wahnapitae First Nation or the spouse and/or children of a band member on-reserve) who are enrolled in a post-secondary mineral industry related school program.

Eligibility Requirements

Applicants must meet the following requirements:

- Must be a Wahnapitae First Nation community member (a band member of the
- Wahnapitae First Nation and/or the spouse and/or children of a band member on-reserve);
- Full time student at an approved Post Secondary institution (College, University) in a program related to the Mining industry;
- Submit a letter to the Wahnapitae First Nation-Xstrata Human Resources
 Working Group requesting the scholarship along with a brief description of your
 education program, with a one page essay on your career aspirations.
- · Provide a letter of reference from a current teacher/professor, Elder or mentor.
- Provide Proof of Academic Record (transcripts for previous year).
- Letters of application to be submitted no later than September 8, 2011 to be considered in the up-coming semester and year, and Awarded October is" of each year.

Who will be Choosen?

The Wahnapitae First Nation Xstrata Scholarship will recognize academic excellence and community spirit. Successful recipients will be well-rounded students who are active participants in the First Nations communities, and who have a keen interest in the earth sciences, mining, engineering/technical and environmental studies.

There are no restrictions preventing scholarship recipients from receiving other grants or awards or income from other sources. Financial need will not be a factor in choosing a recipient. Selection will be based solely on the information and references provided with the letter of application. The Wahnapitae First Nation Xstrata Human Resources Working Group will choose recipients from all applications.

This agreement is made between Laurentian University and Trucclaim Exploration Inc. with the purpose of establishing an annual award to benefit a student enrolled at Laurentian University.

L. Establishment

Laurentian University hereby agrees to establish an annual award to be known as the "Trueclaim Exploration Award" as per the terms of this agreement, to become effective in September 2011.

II. Purpose

Trueclaim is committed to the concept of sustainable development. This requires balancing good stewardship in the protection of human health and the natural environment with the need for economic growth. Diligent application of technically proven and economically feasible environmental protection measures will be exercised throughout our exploration, mining, processing and decommissioning activities to meet the objectives of legislation and to ensure the adoption of best management practices. The purpose of this award is to provide financial assistance annually to a student from the Wahnapitae First Nation enrolled at Laurentian University. Preference will be given to a student enrolled in the following programs: Environmental Studies, Earth Sciences or Engineering.

III. Funding

The awards shall be funded with the following:

- Annual gifts of \$5,000 over 5 years from Trueclaim Exploration Inc.
- 2. Any other gifts which may be designated to this award.

- 4. If there are no applicants or qualified recipients for that year, the funds will be held by Laurentian University to extend the program by another year.



WFN 2011 Pow Wow Update



THEME: The Cultural Advisory Committee would like to thank all of those whom had submitted a theme for this year. Miigwetch! This year's theme is: "Celebrating the Awakening of Our Anishinabek Inner Spirit"! "Minaajtoong Mijiwebnin Gdi-chijaakminan" and for 2012: "Honouring Our Sacred Directions". Yes, things are already being planned for 2012 as mentioned to the Committee, you have to be one step ahead in order to have things organized and planned out; "ready preparedness."

The image displayed is my own voluntary labour, this is the first painting that I ever did and I'm glad to produce something for the community. Not only does it reduce the expenditures for this year's budget, but, as well as potential legalities (ie. copyright). So, let me explain the importance to the creation of the image...

NOTE:

There was no expressed interest for the opportunity for a youth to assist with this year's M.C. role. Therefore, for this year's pow wow, Paul Owl from Cutler First Nation has confirmed to be our youth M.C. as he has the experience

IMAGE DESCRIPTION:

Take note, that the WFN logo digital image was an insert. The original painting has a spirit human form-like figure. Since the Pow Wow is a cultural event within WFN, it is only appropriate to include the logo as this is our celebration open to all!

Within the painting, there are the two levels that consist within the physical realm: there is the "air" or "Father Sky" and below is "earth" or "Mother Earth". With the two, they create balance as so does everything else.

Between the two levels are the circles, this represents the 7 "Grandfather Teachings" or what I refer to them as the "7 Grandmother Teachings". They are:

"Nbwaakaawin" - Courage, "Zaagidwin" - Love, "Mnaadendiwin" - Respect, "Aakde'he'win" - Bravery, "Gwekwaadzinwin" - Honesty, Dbaadendizwin" - Humility, "Debwewin" - Truth

This is what is needed in our everyday lives as human beings. It is essential to have those teachings to remain in balance as we walk through the obstacles of our journeys.

Below the circles are roots, this symbolizes the need to be rooted to our teachings that were or are given to us by the teachers we may come across and so forth. But also, that the roots are what keeps us strong as an individual and the ties that we have with our families, more so, within our community.

Above in the sky, is twirls of energy, vastly go into various directions. That is one reason why it is of great importance to be careful in life of what one may do; as if one is not careful, the actions, decisions...etc. may greatly impact oneself, the children or community itself.

As you may notice, above the centered circle is a solid line of energy with circles along the side; this is to represent the thoughts that are sent to the spiritual realm, further meaning, the prayers directed to the Creator, God or to whatever you may believe in. Basically, that higher power.

Overall, I did try to incorporate the basic colours as there is meaning in that as well. For instance, the four colours representing the four colours of man or the colour pink which to highlight the necessity of living a good life is have love. If we have love in our hearts, we norurish and flourish our inner being and become greater in strength and power; for ourselves, our families and on a whole, our community!

Participants will learn basic and advanced art techniques through fun exercies and produce over 8 finished pieces of art.

Session 1: Participants will be introduced or reminded of the fun in creative play. They will begin with warming up activities using simple drawing materials (crayons, calk, pencils, pencil crayons) on a variety of drawing surfaces. As they are walked through imagination building activities participants will produce many drawings. They will then be introduced to tempra / water based paint learning basic colour mixing and paint techniques. Participants will be able to complete several paintings on paper by end of session 1.

Session 2: Participants will be reminded of the techniques introduced in Session 1. To continue with fun in creative play participants will begin with warming up activities briefly. They will then be introduced to Acrylic water based paint and introduced to a variety of basic colour mixing and paint techniques. By end of session 2 participants will be able to complete several paintings on a sample of different surfaces like canvus, wood / vaneer, leather, etc.... At the end of Session 2 participants will display all works completed in a mini exhibit for all to see and enjoy. This idea is to coincide with this year's Pow Wow theme: "Celebrating the Awakening of Our Inner Spirit" / "Minaajtoong Mijiwebnin Gdi-chijaakminan", so let's celebrate the energy that each one of us within by creating something physical! The art pieces will then be showcased at this year's Pow Wow in recognition of the "inner spirit" of the Wahnapitae First Nation people!

Brake for Turtles!

This is the time of year that snapping turtles lay their eggs, and if left undisturbed, they will hatch by September.

Throughout the month of June, the eggs are laid in sandy areas as well as on the side of road near swamps and creeks.

The snapping turtle is listed as a Species At Risk. Although turtles have many predators – raccoons, skunks, foxes, coyotes, even chipmunks – HUMANS are to blame for their declining population.

Turtles may be becoming extinct on roadsides. Why? Because vehicles run them over, killing them in a single second, when they live to be up to 100 years old!

If you're one of those people who stop to 'save the turtles', it is important to BE SAFE!

Watch out for cars. Park far enough away to make room for other vehicles to go by. Use sturdy gloves if you decide to handle a snapping turtle. And make sure to carry it in the direction that it was headed.

How to carry a snapping turtle:

Throw on a pair of sturdy gloves 2) Grab it from behind so the head doesn't reach you.
 Watch out for the back claws!
 Carry the turtle in the direction it was headed.

If you decide that handling a snapping turtle is too risky, but you still want to help the little guy out, push him from behind in the direction it was headed using anything from a long stick, a snow brush, whatever works!
