

Description of Program:

Through **The CAAC Business Studio**, participants will be provided an avenue to draw upon their natural interests and talents to build skills and future employment/entrepreneurship opportunities. The program will utilize traditional forms of communication (art) to provide training and **'in-the-business'** experience within the practice firm context of a working screen-print operation. Participants will build skills specifically related to their artistic and/or business interests, including graphics and designs, textile printing, serigraphy, production, marketing and sales, communications, and business literacy. Beyond training, participants will work hands on to produce promotional items, develop marketing materials, prospect, secure sales and fulfill orders. Participants will learn directly while transacting with clients, and be able to then take this experience back home to their communities to build economic capacity.

Also incorporated into this project is Equine Assisted Education, a unique leadership and personal development program through which the participants will work with horses to learn about 100% presence, responsibility, self-confidence, awareness, and all that is necessary to develop leadership skills. This unique combination of programming provided through **The CAAC Business Studio**, will enhance participants' self-esteem and leadership capacity while building positive attitudes and skills towards entrepreneurship.

The objectives of the project are to enable Aboriginal Learners to:

Develop communication skills through the use of design

Improve literacy skills, including financial literacy

Build and enhance computer, business and management capabilities

Develop business & artistic talents

Develop employment and/or self-employment potential in the practice firm component of The CAAC Business Studio

James Bartleman

Aboriginal Youth Creative Writing Award

The Honourable James K. Bartleman served as Ontario's 27th Lieutenant Governor from 2002 to 2007. As a member of the Mnjikaning First Nation he was the first Aboriginal Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. Mr. Bartleman is an avid reader and author of four best-selling books.

During his term in office he founded and implemented four Aboriginal Youth Literacy Initiatives:

- Collected 2.3 million books to set up libraries in First Nation communities across the north.
- Linked nearly 150 Aboriginal schools with non-Aboriginal schools across Ontario and Nunavut through the School Twinning Program.
- Established a five-year long Summer Reading Camps Program in 28 fly-in First Nations communities.
- Established the 'Club Amick' Program which provides books and newsletters four times a year to 5,000 children in Onterio's north.

The James Bartleman Aboriginal Youth Creative Writing Award has been set up as a legacy to Mr. Bartleman's far reaching vision and efforts. The program provides Aboriginal youth with an opportunity to showcase their writing abilities.

GENERAL INFORMATION

To commemorate the Honourable James K. Bartleman's term as Ontario's Lieutenant Governor, the Government of Ontario has created the James Bartleman Aboriginal Youth Creative Writing Award.

Each year, the program will recognize up to six (6) Aboriginal students for their creative writing talent. Creative pieces may include, but are not limited to short stories, poems, essays, plays, or songs and must be original work created by the student.

The award will have three (3) categories: fly-in community, on-reserve and off-reserve. For each category, there will be an 'up to 12 years of age' and '13 to 18 years of age' recipient.

Each recipient will receive a certificate and a cash award of \$2,500.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

To be eligible for the award, you must:

- . Be 18 years of age or under.
- Submit an original creative writing piece that has not in any part been copied from any source.
- · Self identify as being Aboriginal.
- Be a student enrolled in a school in Ontario.
- . Be a permanent resident of Ontario.

Although bringing a child into your home can be challenging, the rewards are endless.

A per diem is paid for each night that a child is placed in your home as well other costs known as reimbursables.



Support is provided from Kina Gbezhgomi Foster Care Workers to assist you in caring for chil-

dren placed in your home.



Initial orientation and on-going training is provided such as nutrition, CPR, parenting etc.



Two days of relief a month for regular Foster homes.

ypes of Foster Homes

REGULAR HOME

A regular home provides care for no more than 4 children, and no more than 2 children under the age of 2. It provides all the essentials elements of family life a child needs throughout his/her placement.

CUSTOMARY CARE & KIN CARE HOMES

The Customary Care/Kin Care parents agree to care for a specific child, but do not wish to foster other children. Such a home is opened only for this child.

RELIEF HOME

A regular foster home that requests to only provide relief. Regular foster homes can also provide relief.

SUPPORT HOME

Support homes provide relief for Foster Parents. An individual or family has agreed to provide relief for a specific foster family. Such "Support Homes" are recruited by the foster family and meet safety requirements.

TREATMENT FOSTER CARE HOME

A regular foster home may be classified as a Therapeutic Foster home, according to the special needs of a specific foster child and level of support required.

The number of First Nation Children coming into care of the Children's Aid Society is greater than the n u m b e r of available foster homes within our Seven First Nations.

"Knowing is not enough; We must apply. Willing is not enough; We must do."



Currently there are approximately 95 First Nation Children in the care of C.A.S from our member Seven First Nations.

"Currently we only have homes for 50 percent of these children."



When there are no available First Nation Foster Homes, many of our children are being placed in Non–Native homes off of Manitoulin Island.

"Actions speak louder than words; What are we saying to our children?"



Many of these children are your neighbors, cousins, nieces, nephews, grandchildren, and community members.

"All of these children are our future generation!"

Criminal Record checks for all household members 18 years +.

The process is confidential and will be completed by a Kina Gbezhgomi Foster Care Worker at times that are convenient for your family.

Spiritually grounded, Be strong in their culture,

Experience a healthy, happy and safe life.

Every First Nation child meeting the unfortunate circumstance of having to live away from their family should have the opportunity to remain in their community.

It is our goal to make this possible by encouraging and assisting community members in making a difference in the life of a child by opening up your home to a child in need.

"Be Proactive not Reactive"

Many community members don't realize that once the Children's Aid Society apprehends a child, they are insistent that the child must be placed in a approved Foster Home until family members can be explored.

Identifying and assessing family can take time. While this is being completed the child in care often remains outside of their community in a Foster Home that is unfamiliar to them, creating more unnecessary trauma.

By being proactive and having your home approved you will be ready to accept a placement should one of your own family or community members come into care.






