





Corn Soup Workshop Update

We received a last minute invitation to come to this awesome workshop. We learned the process for making corn soup, beginning with the curing of the Indian corn (hominy).

The facilitator of this workshop was Joyce Tabobondung, an Ojibway woman from Wasauksing First Nation. These teachings were taught to her by her mother, grandmother and great-grandmother. The workshop was inclusive of oral history and how the seven grandfather teachings relate to everyday life. On day 1 we gathered around the fire and Joyce explained to us about the corn being one of the

three sisters and the significance of the corn and our body.

Your fire must be watched, so no one throws garbage in it or spits in it. On the First Nation you have to keep an eye on the dogs so they do not relieve themselves on the fire. It has to be kept very clean.

The first boil of ashes created a lye mix and this was the basis of the lye soap, which was prepared by our mothers and grandmothers.

Day 2

Hominy corn was used to cleanse and keep the body fluids moving.

The corn was added to the lye mixture and boiled for 1.5 hrs. The corn was drained and rubbed then added to fresh water and brought to another 1.5 hr boil. This process is to be repeated 6 times.

At the completion of this workshop, corn soup and scone were provided to the participants and we also got to take a bag of cured corn home.

PUBLIC NOTICE

BY-LAW No. 2006-01

Being a By-Law Respecting the Care and Control of Animals on the Wahnapitae First Nation

**Whereas, the Wahnapitae First Nation has appointed Wenrick Kennels Incorporated,
their employees, servants and agents as Animal Control Officers under the
Wahnapitae First Nation**

By-Law No. 2006-01

This By-law applies to all owners of animals residing or visiting on the Wahnapitae First Nation.

Every person keeping a domestic animal or a household pet on the reserve shall register and identify that animal with reception at the Wahnapitae First Nation Band Office where licenses are issued.

Domestic animal means any ass, boar, bull, bullock, calf, cow, goat, heifer, horse, jackass, lamb, mule, ox, pig, ram, sheep, sow, stallion, rabbit, ferret, or all types of fowl but, is not restricted to such.

Household pet means any cat, dog, rabbit, ferret, or any other animals normally kept or intended to be kept as household pets.

Public Notice regarding By-law No.2006-1 Wahnapitae First Nation Animal Control By-law April 1-2012

Upon registration, identification and payment, a license tag will be issued and will be valid for one year from the date of issue.

Anyone who registers their animals on or before May 31st, 2012 will pay a reduced fee of \$10.00. The fee for registration and identification shall be \$20.00 per year after May 31st, 2012.

Reports of animal abuse or negligence, nuisance or stray animals or vicious animals can be made by calling (705) 673-DOGS (3647) between the hours of 8:30-6:00 p.m. 7 days a week.

Reports regarding injured stray dogs or cats, or situations where a dog or cat is a threat to public safety after hours call: (705) 673-DOGS (3647) and press 1 for emergencies.

This principle supports the Aboriginal student by providing opportunities to highlight and celebrate their Nations. The Shki-Mawtch-Taw-Win-En-Mook (Path to New Beginnings) Curriculum Project in northern Ontario is an example of this value in action. This curriculum consists of a series of First Nation units (with resources) that meet the Ministry of Education expectations – a beautiful collection of lessons and activities (Kindergarten to Grade 12) that honours the contributions of Aboriginal people. The units all begin with Aboriginal expectations and are guided by local Elders. The implications for classroom practice include the following:

- draw on key Aboriginal curriculum resources and utilize them in the school
- create partnerships and establish relationships with Aboriginal communities
- highlight Aboriginal peoples by ensuring that their innovations are included
- bring in various Aboriginal resource people to share their knowledge

I would also like to add that the Camera Video Monitoring system is working in the bus. For the past few years SAPSCU, has received many more applications then we have funds for, and I anticipate this year we will receive even more!

Over the years, some of our students we notified that we didn't have sufficient funds for their application, continued their schooling and went full time with no financial assistance from SAPSCU, applied to OSAP or other means.

Last fiscal year 2010/2011, we had 6 students that went full time without any assistance from SAPSCU. This year we funded 4 of these students who were continuing into their 2nd year of their program and maintained the minimal GPA.

This calender year 2011/2012 we notified many students we had no funds for their application, 7 students went full time without any assistance from SAPSCU. These students will be funded, providing they complete their first year of their program and are allowed to continue into the 2nd year of their program. We even had a few high school graduates from June 2011, who we couldn't fund for the fall of 2011 because of insufficient funds Post Secondary budget!

When SAPSCU, begins approving students who did a year on their own this drastically reduces the number of new applications we can fund every year. For most new applicants, you will be notified after June 29 2012. If we have sufficient funds to fund your application for September 2012.

It is very important to fax in your conditional or final letter of acceptance ASAP. The date we receive it is very important in determining who gets funding.

Continuing students must provide our office a copy 2011/2012 transcripts and maintain the minimal passing average and be able to continue in their program.

Post Secondary Application for 2012/2013 **Sudbury Area Post Secondary Counselling Unit**

Priority will be given to students as follows: (Please read very carefully)

- v 1. Students who were enrolled in Post Secondary studies and maintained the minimal GPA for their program, or graduated from high school or a college entrance program in the preceding academic year and who are continuing in a Post Secondary program of studies. This includes the student who completed an undergraduate degree and wants to continue on to an advance degree programs of studies without a break in studies. It also includes the student who completed a community college or CEGEP program and wants to continue on to an undergraduate degree program without a break in studies.
- 2. Students whose applications for educational assistance were deferred for lack of funds and whom are re-applying for assistance from 2011/2012
- 3. Level III who are not enrolled in Post – Secondary studies the previous academic year.
- 4. Mature students applying to attend post secondary studies for the first time.
- 5. University and College Entrance Preparation Program (UCEPP) students.
- 6. Students returning to post secondary status after having dropped out previously.

The deadline date for the 2012/2013 fiscal year is June 7, 2012.

- v Priority 1 and 2 applications will receive notice immediately that their application is FINAL approved. Some conditions may be placed on your approved application, please read all information provided by us carefully. Failures to meet these conditions will Null & VOID your application, and funds will be reallocated to other students immediately after the deadline date has past.

All applications for priority 3, 4, 5 and 6 will be sent notices after June 29, 2012. If we have sufficient funds to approve their application for funding.

Your Final Acceptance Letter must be sent to our office as soon as possible or by June 7 2012
Applications for Assistance will be NULL & VOID, for failure to meet deadline date!

Applications received after June 7 2012 deadline date, may be placed behind other applications received prior to June 7 2012, and are subject to the availability of funds.

Please print clearly and return all required forms ONLY, back to our office.

Application Checklist

The following documentation must be included with your application before your applications is fully processed, for all first time applicants.


1. Computer Printout Sheet for Educational Assistance (Review carefully, sign & return).
2. Student Information Sheets (Please fill out and return forms immediately)
3. Continuing students . Please send in your **FINAL 2011/2012 Transcripts** to our office by June 7 2012, or your current application will become **NULL&VOID**.
4. NOTE: All full time students must be placed on direct deposit, please send in a VOID cheque or a Direct deposit information sheet from your banking Institution by June 7, 2012. Last years students we have your banking information, on file.
5. Copy of an Acceptance Letter from an approved Post-Secondary Institution and an accredited Post Secondary Program for which the admission requirements is a secondary school diploma. It is very important for the student to send your acceptance letter to our office as soon as possible for prioritization within a priority.

Note; Some Institutions offer programs that are not considered to be eligible for funding under our Post Secondary Policy!

6. Information/Authorization to Release Information Form
7. 2011 Income Tax Statement (if you are claiming dependents)

Bass Lake Sanctuary




