
Sudbury Wolves Outing



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CAMA Youth Panel

For this year's Canadian Aboriginal Minerals Association (CAMA) Conference held in Toronto, I was given the opportunity to be the 2012 Youth Panel Moderator. I spent a few weeks prior to the conference thinking about the message I wanted to send across, and what questions I needed to ask. I focused on the issue of sustainability and mining, enticing discussion about whether those two words together were an oxymoron. How can an activity that takes a finite resource from our Mother Earth be a sustainable practice? Well, it can't. Sustainability needs to be taken out of the sole context of mining, and needs to encompass the entirety of the community, from the land the people dwell on, the health and well-being of the people, secure jobs, safe homes, etc. Sustainability is maintained through positive relations between communities, industry and government. The second message I sent was that of the 3R's. Respect. Responsibility. Reciprocity. I asked those who were present to keep these 3R's in mind when working within the mining industry, and to utilize the 3R's when interacting with communities and the environment. I look forward to being a part of organizing the youth panel for CAMA in Vancouver next year. — Hiedi Manitowabi

Centre of Excelle



Wahnapitae First Nation celebrated the Grand Opening of our new Centre of Excellence on Thursday, November 22, 2012. Well over 100 people were in attendance, including Elders, drummers, fire keepers, band office staff, community members, industry partners, partner organizations, the architect and construction crew, a bus load of students from Aundeck Omni Kaaning, and various other familiar faces.

Just before noon, the four sacred fires that surround the Centre of Excellence at each of the four directions were lit by Fire Keeper Tony Tyson, with helpers Jericho, Tyler and Mike. Kchi Miigwetch. The building was smudged by Tony, with the help of Elders Tina Mandamin and Annabelle McGregor.

Community members and guests from outside of Wahnapitae First Nation streamed into the parking lot of the Centre of Excellence, with some late comers having to park all the way to the road! The beat of the drum, led by Darren McGregor of N'swaakmook Friendship Centre, initiated the beginning of the ribbon cutting ceremony, followed by the opening prayer by Elder Tina Mandamin. The designated ribbon cutters were Claude Rivest of MNDM's Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation, Wahnapitae First Nation's Chief Ted Roque, Ian Horne of KGHM International, and Marc Boissonneault of Xstrata Nickel. After the ribbon was cut and pictures were taken, the doors were opened and everyone streamed into the Maan-doosh-gamig Gathering Place multi-purpose room.

Peter Recollet, Master of Ceremonies, welcomed guests, and introduced delegates to speak on behalf of the community and in regards to the Centre of Excellence. Speakers included Chief Ted Roque and Councillors Larry McGregor, Bob Pitfield, and Rosalee Smith. Hans Matthews was unable to attend, however, sent words of encouragement and celebration. Laroque Elders Architect Jean Laroque spoke about the design of the building, noting that the Centre of Excellence can now act as a central hub to the community, giving a sense of order. He also stated that in the centre of the Maan-doosh-gamig multi-purpose room is a circle, and if you stand in the circle, you have a direct view to the four fire pits that surround the building.

Other invited speakers were: Marc Boissonneault of Xstrata Nickel, Ian Horne of KGHM International, Lawrence Dorey of Health Canada, Claude Rivest of MNDM's Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation, Angela Recollet of Shkakmakwe Health Centre, Mayor Marianne Matichuck of the City of Greater Sudbury, and Deputy Grand Chief Glen Hare. Wahnapitae's most noteworthy guest was Norman Recollet, the last hereditary chief of Wahnapitae First Nation.

The Centre of Excellence began construction in August 2011, and 15 months later, the doors were opened to allow the band office staff to move out of our trailers and into our new building. The new band office houses the departments of governance, administration, finance, sustainable development, housing, health, as well as a kitchen and multi-purpose hall to accommodate the current and future needs of the community.

The Centre of Excellence is inspired by LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design), with the implementation of a number of green initiatives including passive solar heating, geothermal technology, energy conservation, low-impact storm water management, use of recycles and "green" building products and naturalized, low maintenance landscaping, earth-intergrated architecture, and energy efficient motion detection lighting. Jean Laroque of Larocque Elders Architects stated that the Centre of Excellence meets platinum standards under the LEED certification.

The Grand Opening ceremony was a huge success, and the band office staff look forward to making use of the Centre of Excellence and our new offices. Community members are more than welcome to come check out the new building and walk the trail that connects the four fire pits.

Kchi Miigwetch to all that made the event an extraordinary success.



See the big jolly guy - Take children to see Santa, whether he's visiting the local mall or elsewhere nearby. Make sure to get lots of photos.







Environmentally Friendly Alternatives to De-icing Salt

Too often we don't use de-icers properly. Their job is to loosen ice from below making it easier to shovel or plow, not melt the snow completely.

Excessive use of salt as a de-icer is a threat to our pets, wildlife, soil, plants and water quality. Most of us have seen the damaging effects of road salt on our cars, dothes, structures and the environment.


What are some alternatives to salt to keep from slipping and falling this winter?











- Invest in a good shove!
- Sow dust
- Wood chips
- Strow
- Birdseed
- Shredded corn cobs
- Gravel
- Snow cleats for your shoes

SAND — provides traction, is inexpensive, does not harm the environment, and sweeps up easily. Brisk sand is best because it is coarser and more granular than regular sand.

ASHES — Do you use a fireplace at home? Ashes are a convenient and economical alternative to salt. Be careful to keep ashes away from food gardens as there may be heavy metals present. May leave a mess in spring.

KITTY UTTER *- If you have a kitty at home, using kitty litter provides a great deal of traction. This option may be more expensive than other alternatives, but good to use if the litter is already on hand. May leave a mess in spring. **EcoTraction** - offers 35% better traction than sand or kitty

litter, and is 50% lighter. In the spring, EcoTraction can be swept onto your lawn as it has unique properties that improve soil nutrient reservoirs, infiltration rates, aeration and water holding capacity. Ecoflation is available in the Sudbury area at Home Depot, Shopper's Drug Mart, Home Hardware, Giant Tiger and Canadian Tire. Check out www.ecotraction.com

Keep in mind, these alternatives don't necessarily melt the ice, they simply provide traction to keep from slipping and sliding around!

But what if salt is your only option?



Check the label — it is recommended by experts to use calcium chloride over sodium chloride, as calcium chloride works at much lower temperatures and is applied at a lower rate. You can also try "Calcium Magnesium Acetate (CMA) which is less toxic than road salt.

Shovel early and often — when it comes to snow removal, there is no substitute for muscle and elbow grease. De-icers work best when there is only a thin layer of snow or ice that must be melted.

Know your Salt Risk Zone - Some landscaping vegetation are sensitive to salts that contain chlorides (check the label!). Some of these include: red and sugar maples, balsom fir, and white pine.

<u>Roolu Soarinalu</u> - "A little salt goes a long way". The recommended application rate for rock salt is about a handful per square meter as using more salt than this will not speed up the melting process.
