WFN North River Canoe Trip 2013



10 people set off on August 27th 2013 and drove all the way up the North River, past the third bridge and got dropped off with their canoes & gear. Along with them they brought a beaver pelt, symbolic of our fur trading past. The destination for this pelt would be the old Hudson Bay Post which stood at the mouth of the North River in 1822/23. In an effort to recreate the nature of the relationship between WFN ancestors and the traders of the day they would transport this pelt down the historical North River route.

The first day, the canoers got a late start so they did about 5km and then set up camp. The thunderbirds were supposed to visit, according to the weatherman, but they must've had somewhere better to go. It



ended up being beautifully clear for the entire trip. The next day they covered a lot of river!

30kms! All braved the rocky rapids, where; the majority of the group took turns tipping. (The rescue portion of the canoe courses from earlier this month came in handy.) The youth were exhausted after all that. At the second campsite we had some visitors from the community that decided to campout along with the canoers. Councillor



Larry McGregor who had been spotting for the crew all day treated the youth to a movie night, bush style! He put up a sheet and used the projector off his video camera to show highlights of the day's canoeing adventure. It was a perfect way to see any 'slips' and to show the progress in the paddling techniques from earlier in the trip.

Of course the youth had time to get some swimming and sand castle building in!

The food was marvelous; comprised mostly of campfire classics, but, on the last morning, the canoers were treated to Peter's blueberry pancakes and smoked ham! Bill Buchan, one of our eldest canoeists, joked that our company has been spoiled by all this 'glamp'ing! (Glamourized camping). But once again they *needed* their energy! For that day

it was 16Kms against the wind to the mouth of the North River & into Lake Wahnapitae. From there; only 2 canoes continued to battle the white caps of the Lake and paddled all the way up to the docks of Rocky's Restaurant.

This trip was purposed to help re-establish the connection to the land, and to the ancestors. The youth enjoyed themselves all the while learning how it was to live without the luxuries of today (even though they were accused of glamping!), perhaps next year they will have to pack lighter to

thwart such accusations.

On the last day the youth participated in a traditional election for two interim youth representatives for the UOI council. Also on the last day they had a visit from the Provincial Minister of Aboriginal Affairs during which time they were able to have a question & answer period with him, asking some pretty tough questions regarding the environment, budget cuts, the education system curriculum, and commitment to Anishinabek youth.

Moce Walk 2013 Update

The Diabetes Program of Ontario Native Women's Association would like to congratulate you for your efforts in the 2013 Mocc Walk. It was a success beyond our expectations with 1362 walkers across Ontario participating, and this has given us the encouragement to continue with our annual Mocc Walk.



At one time, diabetes was unknown in First Nation, Metis and Inuit communities. Now, current statistics show 1 out of every 4 Aboriginal People will be diagnosed with type 2 diabetes by the year 2016. These rates vary from province to province, and from community to community. This means that some areas rates are far more than triple the national average, whereas others are lower. Approximately two thirds of those Aboriginal people diagnosed are women.

Complications from this chronic disease are serious and can lead to kidney disease, cardiovascular illness, blindness or amputations. **If you are physically active, you are less likely to develop type 2 diabetes.** Physical Activity also helps to keep your blood levels controlled, not only that, but being active helps you deal with lifes' problems, such as stress. Walking also helps keeps your weight down., gives you more energy, tones and builds muscles, and lowers your chance of heart disease (which is a serious problem for those with diabetes, especially if they smoke). So walking and excerising is a well worth effort.

Although prizes where awarded to the top walkers and teams, everyone who participated is a winner, by keeping themselves healthy, and creating a better lifestyle for themselves and those around them. Just remember, it is important for you to stay active all year long, even if you are disabled or injured. Activity can make you more healthy and feel better, just don't forget to listen to your body.

Remember, change your lifestyle and you can reduce the effects of diabetes altogether. *Received from the Ontario Native Women's Association*



Wahnapitae First Nation, in partnership with the Anishinabek/Ontario Fisheries Resource Centre (A/OFRC), will be conducting an electrofishing survey in Post Creek from August 27 to August 29. This survey will assess the fish community within Post Creek to determine the presence and abundance of fish species within the creek.

Post Creek is a relatively large creek that flows throughout the traditional territory of Wahnapitae First Nation and drains into Lake Wanapitei. This electrofishing study will be complimented with a fall survey for benthic invertebrates, which can be used to assess aquatic ecosystem health. By collecting information on the fish and benthic communities within Post Creek, we will be able to assess the overall health of Post Creek.

The A/OFRC is a not for profit organization that serves as an independent source of information. The Centre provides information and recommendations for sustainable fisheries management, reports on stock status, evaluates stresses on fish populations and habitats, and offers technical support.

Wahnapitae First Nation Sudbury INO Post Secondary Scholarship Fund

Limited Qualified Candidates to Receive up to \$10,000 each toward Post Secondary Studies

Both the Wahnapitae First Nation and Sudbury Integrated Nickel Operations (INO), a Glencore Company, believe in the importance of a good education for Community members for the betterment of both Wahnapitae First Nation and operations in the Sudbury area. Sudbury INO, through a formal agreement with Wahnapitae First Nation in 2008, has sponsored an annual scholarship fund to support post-secondary education and training programs. The scholarship fund is aimed at assisting community members of the Wahnapitae First Nation to pursue careers in the mining related and mineral processing field.

Both Wahnapitae First Nation and Sudbury INO have established a joint Human Resources Working Group to develop the criteria and mechanisms to select candidates and to administer this scholarship fund.

Scholarship Details

The Human Resources Working Group will determine eligible candidates. The annual scholarship is awarded annually to up to 3 (three) successful students, up to a maximum of \$10,000 per candidate per year. For scholarship recipients to continue to receive an annual scholarship, they must RE-APPLYANNUALLY. The scholarship will be awarded to qualified Wahnapitae First Nation Community members (those who are a band member of the Wahnapitae First Nation or the spouse and/or children of a band member on-reserve) who are enrolled in a post-secondary mineral industry related school program.

Should vacancies still remain, applicants in other fields of studies related to mining support groups may be considered.

Eligibility Requirements

Applicants must meet the following requirements:

- Must be a Wahnapitae First Nation community member (a band member of the Wahnapitae First Nation and/or the spouse and/or children of a band member onreserve);
- Full time student at an approved Post Secondary institution (College, University) in a program related to the Mining industry or Mining industry support services;
- Submit a letter to the Wahnapitae First Nation-Sudbury INO Human Resources Working Group requesting the scholarship along with a brief description of your education program, with a one page essay on your career aspirations;
- Provide a letter of reference from a current teacher/professor, Elder or mentor.
- Provide Proof of Academic Record (transcripts for previous year);
- Letters of application to be submitted no later than September 30th, 2013 by 4:00 p.m. to be considered in the up-coming semester & year, and Awarded October 15th of each year.
